Strange things are happening but God is still in control

After a week of landmark U.S. Supreme Court decisions in which samesex marriage was legalized in all 50 states, Pastor Cameron Madison Alexander reminded his beloved Antioch Baptist Church North congregation that God is still souvreign.

"I don't care how much you celebrated yesterday, God is in control of the universe," the Rev. Cameron Madison Alexander told the Antioch Baptist Church North congregation to applause.

Then drawing from passages in the books of Acts and Luke, he reminded them of the Apostle Paul's missionary trip to Athens, where the people worshiped all sorts of gods.

Jumping into the theological argument of the day, Alexander said Paul noted in Luke 5:25 that he'd seen strange things.

"This last week we've heard things and we've seen strange things," Alexander said. "Someone asked me where are we headed? I said we're headed for judgment. That's a day you better put on your calendar. God promised there would be a judgment day and he will be the judge. The Supreme Court judges will be judged. In fact, everybody will be at the judgment. We'll be judged on our stewardship here in this world."

Strange things.

And yet, he said, nothing happens in this world where we move and have our being, where we see strange things that surprises God.

"None of us can do anything to surprise God," he said. "God's stuff is always going to stand. Everything he set in motion is still working. Just because we have operations doesn't mean we've changed creation. When you go into the hospital to have an operation you didn't change anything. The best you can do is move stuff around."

Strange things.

He felt the same way, he said, when

Lester joins Supreme Court bar

If you've seen Sylvia Lester direct Antioch Baptist Church North's Adult Handbell and Women's Choirs, imagine her arguing cases before the U.S. Supreme Court.

Lester, a longtime member of Antioch and the Georgia bar, was sworn in June 22 before the nine justices. This honor grants her the privilege of arguing cases before the Supreme Court instead of having to turn cases over to another attorney. It is recognition that one is at the top of the legal profession.

To qualify, applicants must be a member of his or her state's bar, be endorsed by two other Supreme Court bar members, and obtain a certificate of good standing from the state's highest court.

"Good standing" means that the lawyer has no judgments, complaints, or disciplinary action against him or her and exhibits "good moral and professional character."

The Seven Last Words of Jesus Christ

It is a tradition at Antioch to observe Good Friday with preaching by the sons of the church on the seven last recorded statements of Christ. On April 3, the 26th annual service opened with a replication of Christ carrying the cross by Antioch M.A.D.D. followed by the processional of Antioch's ministers.

Here's a synopsis of the seven last words by Antioch's sons:

Minister Michael Price

Scripture: Luke 23:34 • Word: Forgiveness

Summary: "People who know they are close to the end of earthly life say what is at the core of their hearts and souls. Jesus's first statement covers all of the statements that follow, what he said before, and what will come after. Jesus went to the cross as the final answer to the sin issue. Forgiveness was necessary for man to be able to commune with God and go to heaven."

Minister Derek McKinney

Scripture: Luke 23:42-43 • Word: Salvation

Summary: "Both of the thieves were on the cross reaping their 'sin crops; the only difference is that one mocked and the other received salvation from Jesus. The price Jesus paid on Calvary covers the sins of the lamb and the wolf. As a seasoned preacher said, 'God is the I in each person's I am.' God gives us free will to choose the blank in the phrase. He chose I am thief, but he also chose I am thief who believes in Jesus Christ, the Son of God."

Minister Walter Collins

Scripture: John 19:25-27 • Word: Affection

Summary: "In spite of everything Jesus had been through up until this point, he still had affection. Christ made sure that the disciple John and his mother not only showed affection toward him but developed a new connection of affection toward each other, son toward mother. It always has been and will be Christ's will that we show feelings of affection, love toward one another, toward everyone who comes across our pathways, for it may be just what that person needs to keep going."

Scripture: Matthew 27:46 • Word: Anguish

Summary: "Having been silent during the three hours of darkness, Jesus cries out in anguish. Jesus calls on his God, not on himself as God, but as a man who was given the sin of the entire world to bare. He understood that the separation had to occur because he could not be God and have sin on himself at the same time. Anguish, torment and distress, happens when something is in conflict. Once you have come to know God, separation from God causes anguish."

Scripture: John 19:28 • Word: Suffering

Summary: "Jesus was fully divine but also fully human, and in his humanity, he was suffering from dehydration. He went through the pain and suffering for your sins and for mine, so that we know that when we have pain, we are not alone. Jesus bears the pain, also. He understands our suffering. We need liquid water, but we also need the living, spiritual water that belief in Jesus provides, so we will not wander in the desert but have eternal life with God."

Scripture: John 19:30 • Word: Victory

Summary: "Jesus has won in taking victory: victory over death, sin, hate, and mankind. There was no one else who could take up the fight over sin and win. Jesus was willing and able. The devil doesn't like it that Jesus won. The word was made flesh because blood is in the flesh, and blood had to be shed for the remission of sins. Victory in Jesus!"

Scripture: Luke 23:46 • Word: Contentment

Summary: "It is difficult to digest that Jesus was 'happy and satisfied' as he hung on the cross as he was going through the most excruciating pain that everyone could imagine. Jesus is perfectly content as in the sixth word he said, 'It is finished', and he knew the sufferings were almost over. Through various stages of life, when we fulfill momentous occasions, we have reasons to feel content. Twenty-eight prophecies were fulfilled in Jesus's death, so he was content that his purpose was fulfilled.

Antioch takes ministry to the Bluff

"The Bluff" has been characterized as one of the most desolate and dangerous communities in Atlanta.

In January, the community was the subject of a WSB television news feature about the high prevalence of drug use, sales, and overdoses in what is called "Atlanta's most notorious heroin highway." The focus of the news report was the use of the drug Narcan (naloxone hydrochloride) to reverse overdoses. In the report, a drug user who admitted to selling drugs to support his habit, administered a shot to a woman who was the way to eternal life. overdosing.

"We always send a prayer," he said. "Prayer helps us to be guided to save these victims."

The woman lived.

Like Jesus in his encounter with the woman at the well, Antioch Ministers spread out on the street corners April 4 throughout "The Bluff" to present the living water of Jesus Christ.

But unlike the one-time life-reversing shot, the sons of Antioch were presenting

They were joined by the S.W.A.T. Team and a large delegation of members who witnessed, evangelized, and proclaimed God's Word. Members gave sack lunches and tracts as they shared God's word, prayed with those requesting prayer, and invited people to attend Resurrection Sunday services the next day at Antioch.

At the culminating prayer gathering, one person gave his life to Christ, and five asked for prayer.

Four preachers expounded on the theme, "The Cross": Rev. Demetrius Myette, Matt.21:1-9, "To the Cross;" Rev. Donald Hill, Matt. 19:18, "At the Cross;" Rev. Donel Heflin, Sr., Matt. 27:58, "To the Grave," and Mark 16:9, Rev. Rickey Jones, "From the Grave."

Rev. W.J. Lawson, 5th District President, encouraged everyone in his closing remarks to remember that "when you encounter the brutality of the cross, remember there is a Sunday morning resurrection."

NBC holds Congress of Christian Education

The National Baptist Convention USA, Inc. Congress of Christian Education met June 21-26 in Detroit, where classes, seminars and workshops are held in every aspect of Baptist doctrine and mission.

In addition to the Certificate of Progress Program which leads to a Diploma of Christian Education, members can participant in everything from Advanced Church Ushering taught by Sis. Brenda Eason to a Sign Language Interpreter's Clinic headed by Sis. Janet M. Hill. Eason and Hill are members of Antioch Baptist Church North.

Classes for children, youth, and young adults and the Children's and Youth Rallies and iRock Young Adult Explosion provide training for every age and stage of life.

As the educational arm of the Convention, President Jerry Young has charged the Congress to provide a curriculum that supports his passion to have a Convention fully committed and trained "from the pulpit to the pew to comprehend the application of scripture to our daily lives and to share the good news of the gospel."

Worship services during the five-day congress are held morning through late night and feature world renowned preachers. A special prayer service was held in honor of those whose lives were taken and the survivors of the attack at Emanuel A.M.E. Church in Charleston, S.C.

The Health Fair that runs the entire week provides free health screenings, materials, and seminars explaining how to access resources to provide summer meals for low-income children, treatment for recovering addicts, and housing for the homeless.

Depression topic of ministry brunch

The 5th Annual Care and Comfort Ministry/AUMI Brunch Fellowship was held May 16.

The theme scripture, Psalm 34:24, formed the framework of courage, strength, and hope for the fellowship, all of which Sis. Renee Arnold expressed in her touching testimonial.

The slide show featuring pictures of the Care and Comfort Ministry in service and those whose lives they have touched showed the depth and breadth of the ministry, which reaches out to anyone experiencing any type of illness, loss, or life trial.

Young Bro. William Evans made a special tribute to Pastor Alexander, and Sis. Kirkland gave a heartfelt tribute to Mother Frances Miles embodying the courage, strength, and hope in the Lord each has modeled throughout their lifetimes.

One of the evidences of that strength and wisdom is Pastor Alexander's recognition that the needs of Antioch members are not limited to spiritual growth and his support to bring in a guest speaker on a topic rarely addressed in churches.

The guest speaker, Dr. Kenneth W. Hepburn, addressed the topic of depression. In his presentation, he dispelled many of the myths about depression, discussed how to recognize signs and symptoms, presented types of treatment available, and provided resources.

Not everyone who is depressed experiences every symptom. Some people experience only a few symptoms; some people suffer many. The severity of symptoms varies among individuals and also over time.

They include:

- Persistent sad, anxious, or "empty" mood
- Feelings of hopelessness, pessimism
- Feelings of guilt, worthlessness, helplessness
- Loss of interest or pleasure in hobbies and activities
- Decreased energy, fatigue, being "slowed down"
- Difficulty concentrating, remembering, making decisions
- Difficulty sleeping, early-morning awakening, or oversleeping
- Appetite and/or weight changes
- Thoughts of death or suicide; suicide attempts
- · Restlessness, irritability
- Persistent physical symptoms


In a powerful message from Min. Oscar Scott, students were given five "stones" to guide them through school and YOUTH ACHIEVEMENT BANQUET

Ushers and Health Professionals Auxiliary had been traveling across the state

to churches, large and small, presenting training Eason had received at the NBC sessions. She suggested to President Alexander that a larger number could be reached through a statewide conference and he supported the idea. In 1995, the first conference was held and has grown to include more than 2,000 attendees.

On Wednesday afternoon, delegates accompanied the Saints with a Testimony and witnessed in a designated area of the city. This year, the evangelistic efforts inspired one soul to accept Christ and numerous people having prayer with the team.

"In music I'll bring back old styles of


music, mix it with today's style, and then create a style that will change the face of the music industry," he said.
